Our traditional Professional Services Scope includes:

Stage 01 - Inception

Stage 02 - Concept and Viability

We prepare an initial design and advise on the intended space provisions and planning relationships; proposed materials and intended building services the technical and functional characteristics of the design; we check for conformity of the concept with the rights to the use of the land; Review the anticipated costs of the project and review the project program

Stage 03 - Design development

Confirm the scope and complexity

Review the design and consult with local and statutory authorities Develop the design, construction system, materials and components Incorporate all services and the work of consultants Review the design, costing and program with the consultants

The design is now refined with detail and coordinated with consultant and trade advice

Stage 04.1 - Building approva

At this point, we need to ensure the documentation complies with the building code and seek approval for the construction of your project from the relevant authorities

Stage 04.2 Construction documentation

A detailed set of drawings and specification are prepared so that tenders can be sought, a contract signed and the project built

Stage 05 - Construction period

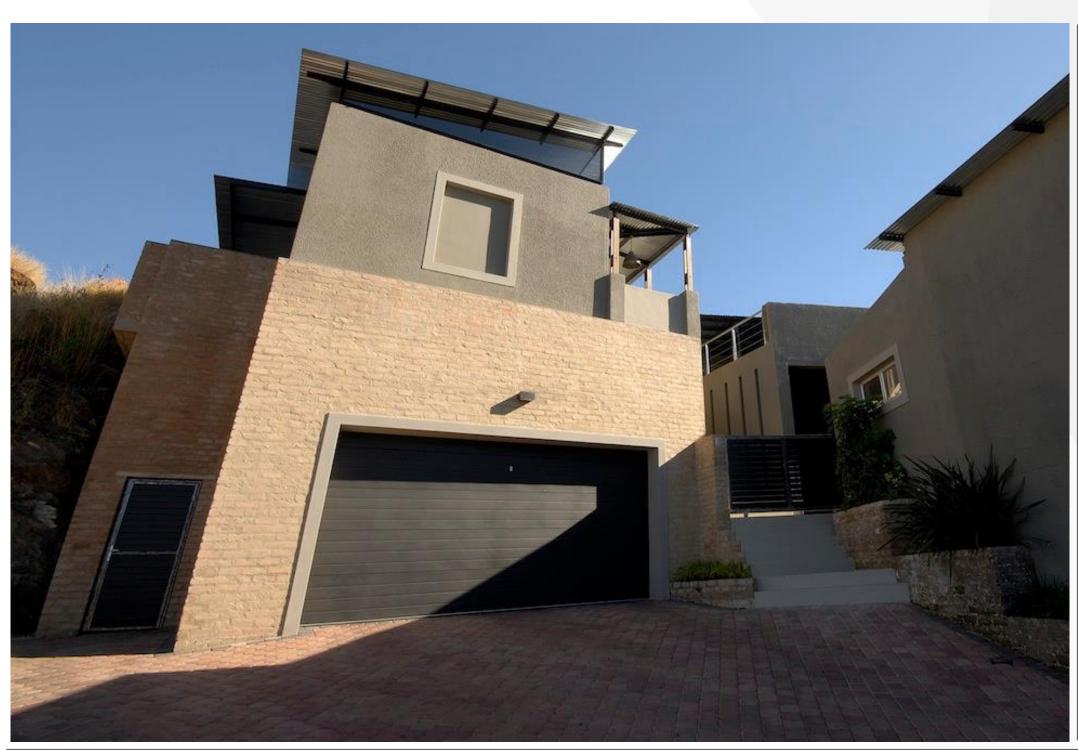

ONDONDU VILLAGE

The client bought a large erf in a quiet side street in Windhoek. A large erf with a small existing house and one large mountain. We designed a small village around those 2 elements. Materials were washed red bricks, steel and textured walls. Each unit is totally private yet part of the whole and part of the sense of community.

The end result was a little village with 5 houses, all of the same but not the same. And it turned into one of the most sought after complexes in the neighbourhood.

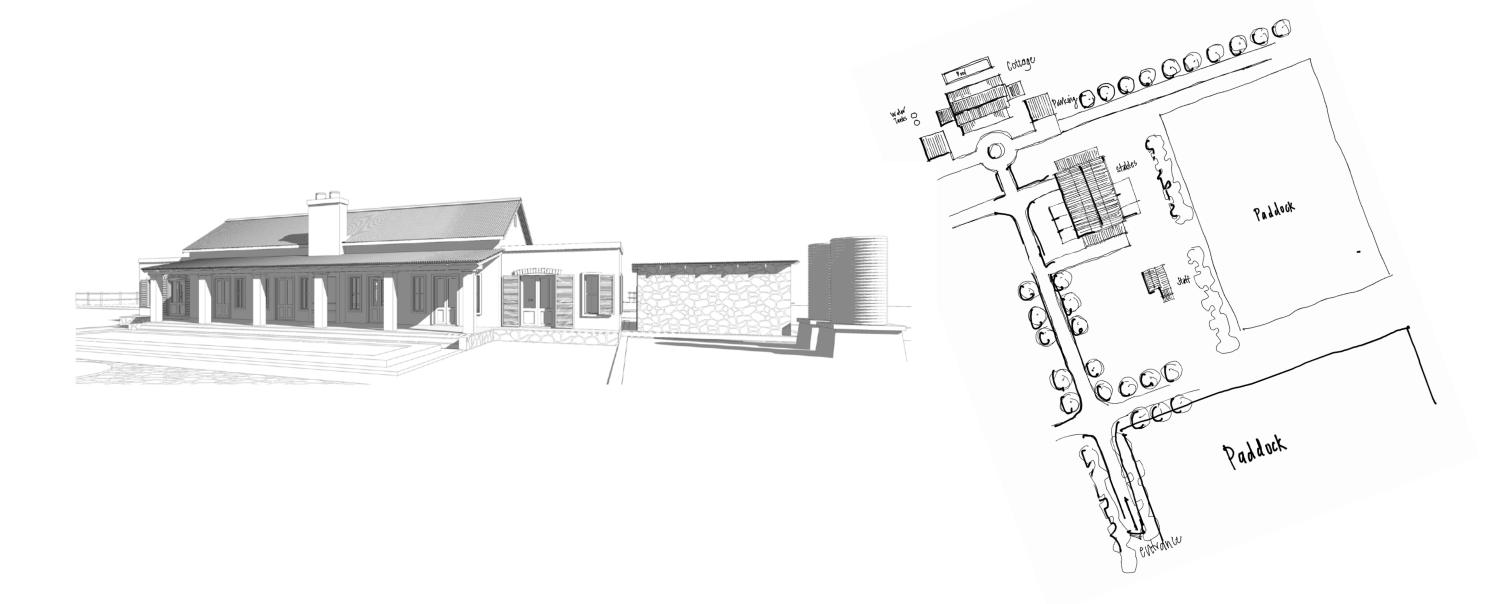










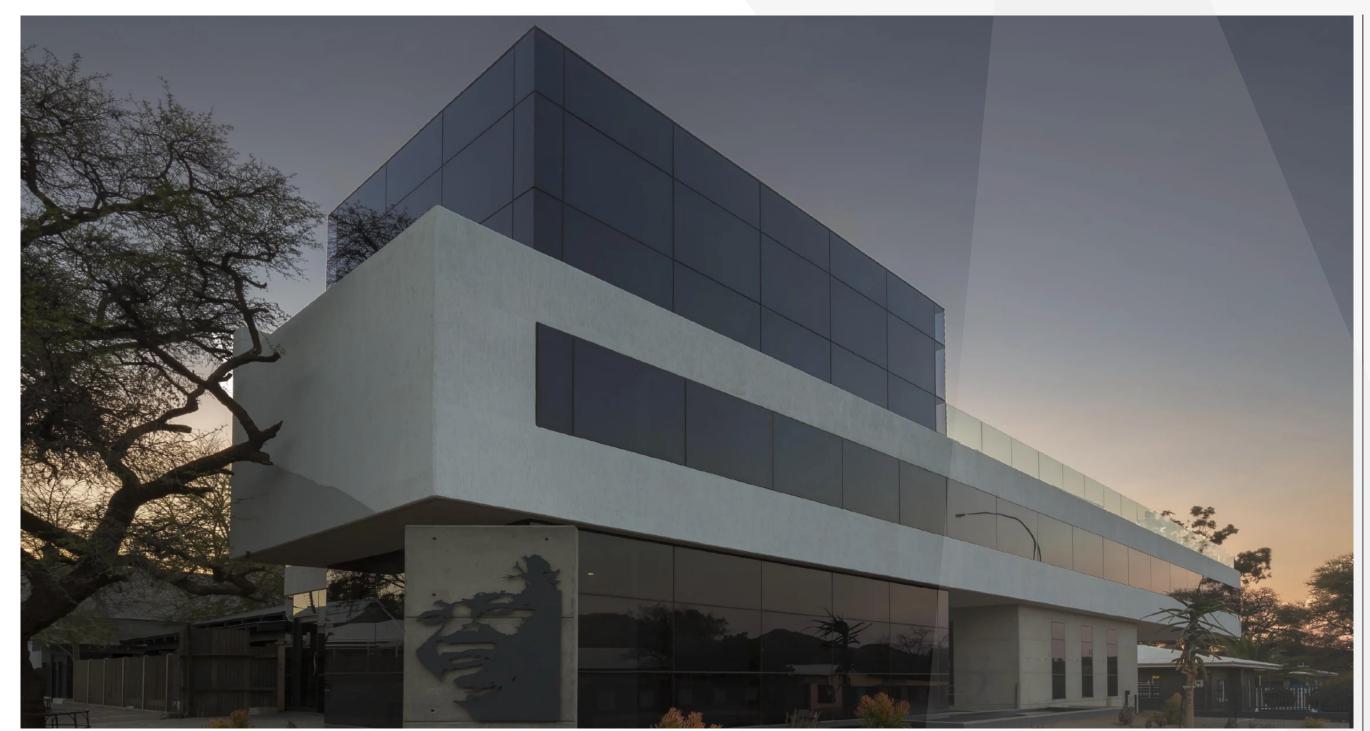


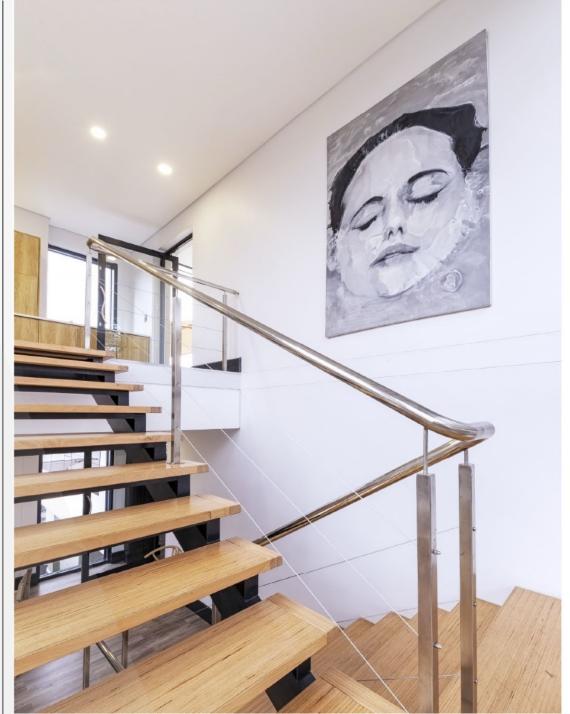
EQUESTRIAN CENTRE

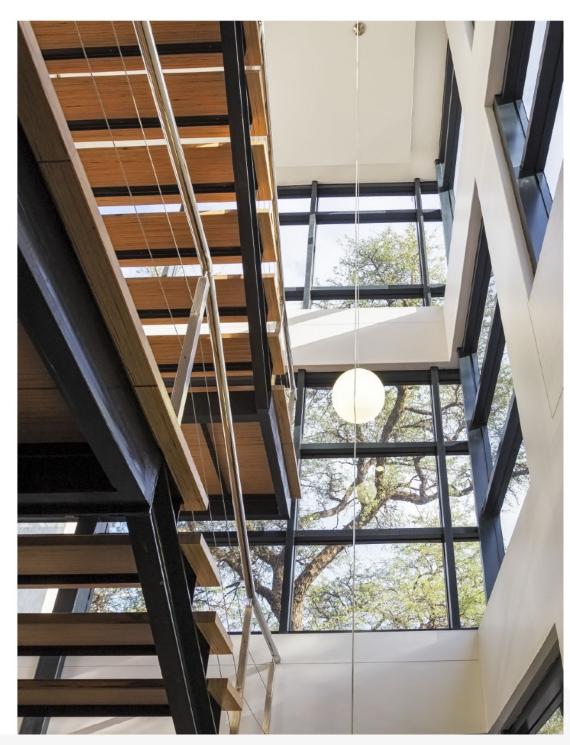
Our client wanted a small boutique equestrian centre, with a residential component for the young family (a 2 bedroom cottage), stables, a paddock and ring, 2 arenas and staff facilities.

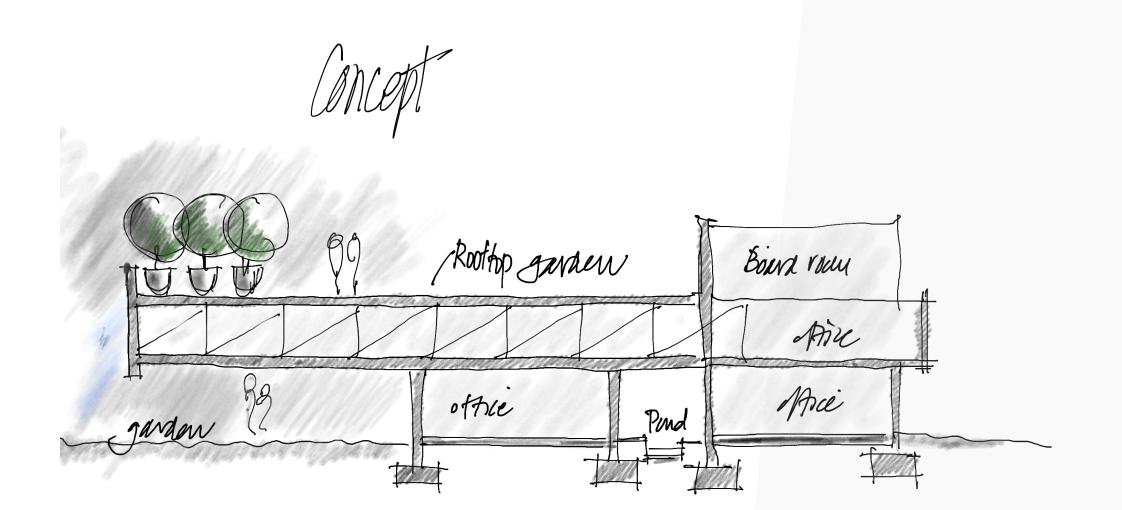
They designed the small estate around a central "werf" idea. The cottage and all the "work areas" formed an integral part of the whole. One enters via a long planted driveway leading up to the cottage with a large water feature, with reference to a "please dam". The stables and staff quarters are all placed along this access road.

The idea was also that any future additions could easily be added, and that would only enhance the concept even more.









MADIBA'S CORNER

The available site was long and narrow – facing the very busy Nelson Mandela Avenue and an equally busy intersection. The available site area determined to a large extent the shape of the new building. A large Kameeldoorn tree on the pavement next to the new building could not be removed and we worked very carefully around it. We worked closely with Nik Moroff and the subsequent design was a building consisting of 2 rectangular bases 5,000 x 9,440, housing 2 small offices, supporting a 38,250 x 5,760

First Floor open plan office area, cantilevering 14 meters, with a glass box board room and roof garden on the Top Floor. We opted to keep the architecture extremely simple, as the structure of the building became an engineering exercise. The steel structure was kept visible, for the inhabitants to experience the way in which the building was put together.

The building quickly became a strong presence on this busy corner, somehow sheltering the farm style small offices at the back from the busy street, but also interacting with the traffic and pedestrians on Nelson Mandela avenue.





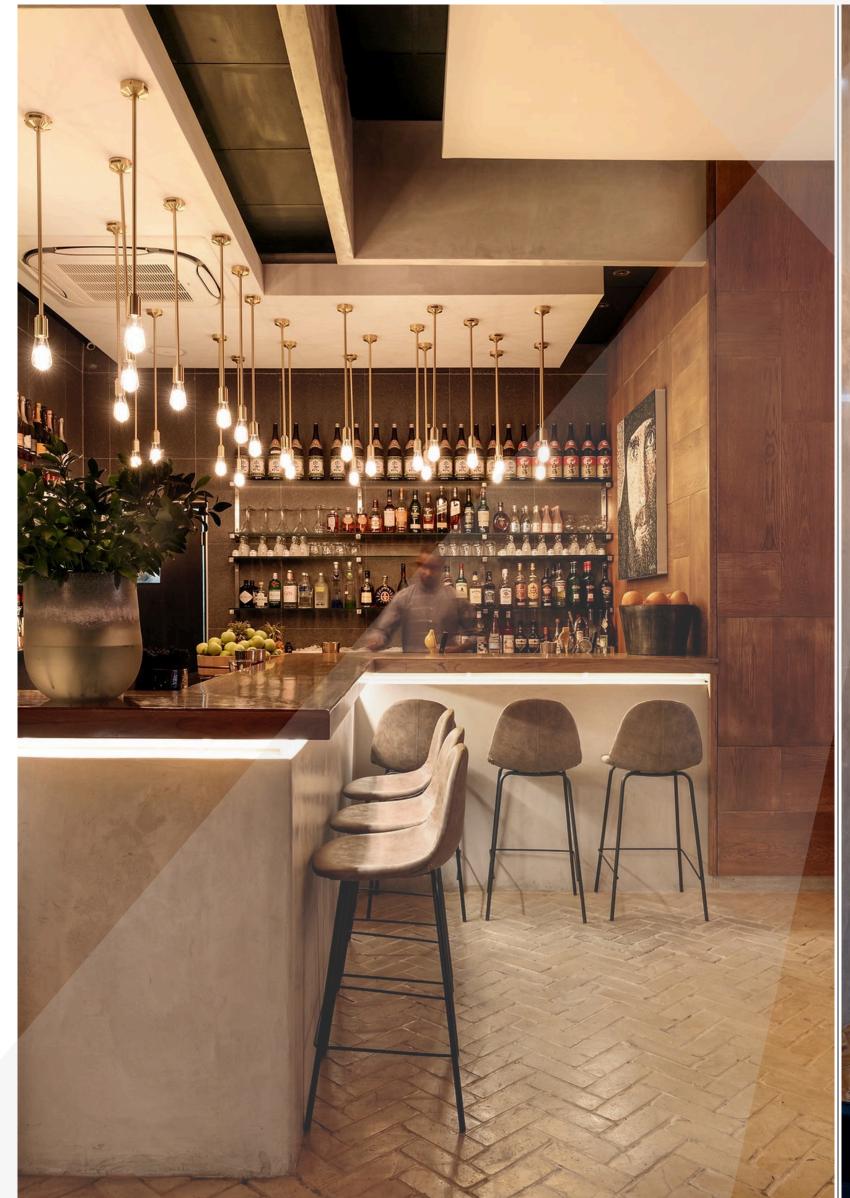


AM WEINBERG HOTEL

The brief included the following: boutique, warm and inviting, could include a few quirks, "Make it nice....."

We designed a courtyard hotel with a central garden area, complete will all edible plants and a water feature. The court yard space links the hotel with the historical building which houses the Seafood restaurant.

The interior were conceptualised by us, but Howard and Chamberlain Architects were tasked with the implementation of the Hotel interior.





SUMI RESTAURANT

It is pronounced - soomē

Sumi means black ink, originating from the Japanese culture.

We were responsible for the conceptualisation and entire interior of this fine dining restaurant. We also designed the artwork and were responsible for choosing all crockery and cutlery and uniforms.

Luxury, Privacy, Relaxation and food handled with respect are key elements of the dining experience at Sumi. The robata grill is located as a centre focal point forming the main design element in the restaurant.

Robata "Robatayaki" which originates from the Japanese fishermen who would cook their fish on their boats with charcoal and then share the food with one another using their oars.

The Robata is not just a feature, the robata is the beating heart of Sumi, the area from which all energy flows, a energy of warmth and enjoyment while the guests admire the respect given to food.

This is the sophisticated twist on the original Japanese style of eating and drinking.





DEIDRÉ & CO SHOP

This is our own flagship retail shop - showcasing our own products, designed and made in our workshop. We retail in 100% linen clothing, linen homeware and timber furniture.

We wanted this space to embody our aesthetic and the look and feel to tell our story.

Except for the central table, all the timber shop fitting items were manufactured from reclaimed French oak, designed and manufactured by us.

The space is quiet, understated but packs a punch.
